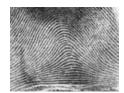




<u>Superbowl XXXIX Security</u> - The National Football League played its largest game of the year in Jacksonville's Alltel Stadium on February 6. Due to Department of Homeland Security warnings about security threats to large public gatherings, FDLE, in concert with the St. Johns and Duval County Sheriffs offices operationalized a security plan involving intelligence assessments, waterborne security deployment, and the protection of player hotel and practice fields. FDLE's North and South Region Special Operations Teams provided 24-hour security at the player's hotels and provided security for team motorcade movements. FDLE dedicated more than 8,300 investigative and intelligence hours to the event.



<u>Cargo Theft Security Summit Lays Foundation for National Strategy</u> - FDLE hosted the second annual Cargo Security Summit on February 16 and 17 at Tallahassee Headquarters. The event provided a forum for government agencies and private industry partners to discuss security and crime issues related to the cargo industry. Results from these discussions are expected to lay the foundation for a national strategy in the fight against cargo crime in the United States. Nearly 200 representatives from government, law enforcement, and private industry from 23 states participated in the conference to discuss a proposal for a national threat assessment; improving intelligence and information sharing; and proposed legislative changes to Florida's cargo theft statute.



New Missing Children Project Using Fingerprint Technology Underway — In February, FDLE's Missing Children Information Clearinghouse (MCIC) rolled out a new initiative in an effort to solve missing children cases through the use of fingerprint technology. Local law enforcement agencies may now contact MCIC to submit fingerprints on active missing children cases meeting certain criteria. The child's prints are entered into the Automated Fingerprint Identification System where they can be searched with unidentified deceased prints, incoming arrests, and crime scene latent prints. In the event a fingerprint from the child generates a "hit", the agency will be advised that the fingerprints belong to a missing child and will contact FDLE.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> <u>Average number of days to complete lab service requests</u> - Laboratory turnaround standards and productivity were significantly affected by the four hurricanes that occurred during the first quarter. FDLE's seven labs were non-operational a total of 36 days due to hurricane preparation. The Pensacola laboratory is now operating from a temporary location and completing casework in chemistry, latents, and crime scene. Pensacola scientists are completing limited casework in firearms and DNA, with some of this work being conducted in the Tallahassee laboratory.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Investigative Services - Investigative measures were significantly impacted during the hurricanes of the first quarter, and, as a result, short-term investigative assists, the number of cases closed, resolved, and resulting in an arrest, and the number of public assistance fraud investigations remains below the level expected through the third quarter. Investigative resources from throughout the state were redirected to assist with hurricane recovery efforts.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> <u>Number of criminal history errors corrected</u> - The reduction in the number of criminal history errors corrected in the Computerized Criminal History (CCH) files can be attributed to several factors. The data-cleansing project (which was undertaken as part of the preparation for the Integrated Criminal History System) is nearing a conclusion, and the number of corrections has been greatly reduced. Additionally, the training of local law enforcement agencies on electronic livescan submissions has increased and the number of errors by those submitting agencies has subsequently decreased.

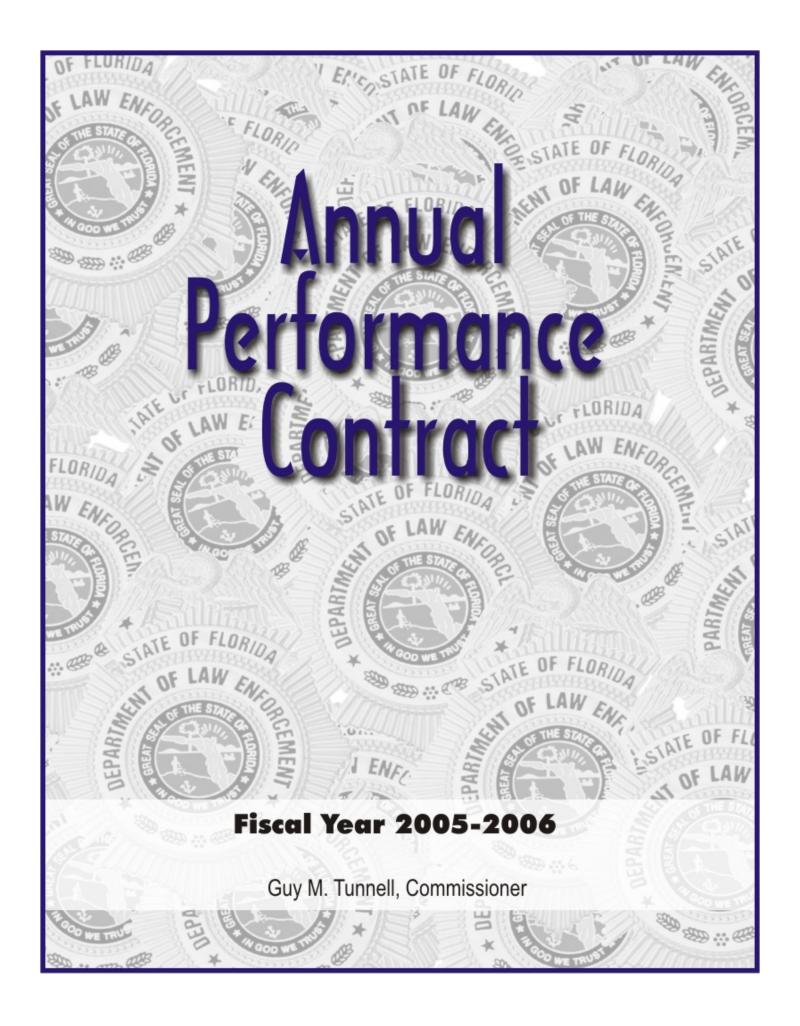
