2	GOVERNOR BUSH: Today we need to appoint a Parole
3	Qualifications Committee to consider the applications
4	for a vacancy on the Parole Commission that will occur
5	this June. The Parole Commission and each of us have
6	submitted a name for the five-member committee. We
7	also need to select a committee chair.
8	The following individuals have agreed to be
9	considered: Ed Spooner from Gadsden County, Judge
10	Allawas from Brevard County, Sheriff Don Hunter from
11	Collier County, State Attorney Jerry Blair from
12	Suwannee County, Sheriff Jim Coats from Pinellas
13	County.
14	CFO GALLAGHER: Governor, I move all of those and
15	to make Ed Spooner the chairman.
16	GOVERNOR BUSH: Is there a second?
17	COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second.
18	GOVERNOR BUSH: Any objections? There's a motion
19	and a second. Without objection, the slate carries in

GOVERNOR BUSH: There's a motion and a second. Without objection, Item 1 passes. Hello, Coleman. MR. STIPANOVICH: Good morning, Governor, members. Thank you. Item number 2 is request for approval of fiscal determination of an amount not exceeding \$9,900,000 tax exempt Florida Housing Finance Corporation multifamily mortgage revenue refunding bonds. ATTORNEY GENERAL CRIST: Motion. CFO GALLAGHER: Second. GOVERNOR BUSH: There's a motion and a second. Without objection, the item passes. Thank you, Coleman. That's the shortest.

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1 GOVERNOR BUSH: What do we tax? 2 MR. ZINGALE: If you have your device, your phone attached to your computer and you're making a 3 4 communication with that, that is taxable. 5 CFO GALLAGHER: How is it taxed? 6 MR. ZINGALE: It's a rate on service, like a phone 7 charge would be. 8 CFO GALLAGHER: How does one know -- how do you 9 know what somebody is using on their Internet, whether they're sending an e-mail or sending a voice? How 10 11 would you know that? 12 MR. ZINGALE: Well --13 GOVERNOR BUSH: Here she comes. The bail-out 14 artist. 15 MS. ECHEVERRI: There are companies that -- Lisa Echeverri, Department of Revenue. There are companies 16 that provide that service for voice over Internet 17 18 protocol, and they bill you on a bill that looks very much just like your phone bill or your wireless bill, 19 and the communication services tax applies to those 20 21 charges made by the company for the service provided. 22 GOVERNOR BUSH: As though they were a regular phone call. 23 24 CFO GALLAGHER: If you have your own internal 25 Internet and you use that to communicate with your own

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1 offices and you don't have one of those services, you
2 just do it yourself, how does one know how much you're
3 using?

MS. ECHEVERRI: Well, I'm not familiar with that 4 5 setup. I mean, in most cases you're using some kind of 6 provider that allows you to -- and you don't buy the 7 equipment from them. You may have your own equipment 8 that you've purchased somewhere else that you hook up. 9 But you are going through some sort of provider. I'm not sure if there's a use tax provision with respect to 10 11 setting it up yourself.

12It certainly, if it was under that substitute13systems provision, that has been repealed, so --

14 CFO GALLAGHER: I'm well aware of that.

MS. ECHEVERRI: So this is just when a company provides that service to you, the same way they provide any other telecommunication service.

18 CFO GALLAGHER: Okay. So if there's a carrier 19 involved, is what you're talking about basically.

20 MS. ECHEVERRI: Yes.

21 CFO GALLAGHER: Okay. Good enough.

22 GOVERNOR BUSH: All right. Is there a motion?

23 CFO GALLAGHER: I move Item number 2.

24 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second.

25 GOVERNOR BUSH: There's a motion and a second.

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1	Without	objection,	Item 2	passes.	Thank	you,	Jim.
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1 GOVERNOR BUSH: Board of Trustees.

2 MS. CASTILLE: Good morning, Governor, members of the Cabinet. Item 1 is the Tri Delta corrective 3 4 quitclaim deed and modification of deed restrictions. 5 This is the recommendation of a corrective deed from 6 the BOT, Board of Trustees, to the Tri Delta sorority 7 through the University of Florida. This is a deed 8 restriction -- I mean a deed restriction -- a deed 9 amendment that they're requesting. CFO GALLAGHER: Now, this is an interesting issue 10 because all of the sororities and fraternities that we 11 allow on our land, campuses basically, they limit how 12 13 many students are staying in there by these deed 14 restrictions. 15 MS. CASTILLE: Correct. CFO GALLAGHER: And every time they want to build 16 17 an addition and have more people there, they go to the university. The university gives them permission. Is 18 there a reason why we need to -- couldn't we put a deed 19

20 restriction in there that would basically leave it up
21 to the president of the university to say how many
22 students can be there?

23 MS. CASTILLE: We could do that. However, the 24 university is requesting that we keep this -- that we 25 keep the Cabinet in there.

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1 CFO GALLAGHER: So the president doesn't have to 2 be the one to say how many they do or don't have? MS. CASTILLE: They would like to have a policy 3 4 that caps the number of students or the number of the 5 buildings that can cap the number of students that can 6 live on the property. 7 CFO GALLAGHER: I'm for the policy, but I don't 8 know why we wouldn't have the president make the --9 make the policy. GOVERNOR BUSH: General. 10 ATTORNEY GENERAL CRIST: Thank you, Governor. 11 I would agree with the Treasurer. I mean, can't we leave 12 13 these kinds of decisions regarding Tri Delt to the 14 university president? 15 MS. CASTILLE: I believe that we can. However, we're in a situation where there are bid -- there are 16 bids that have been out for construction that are 17 18 setting to expire. And the university and the sorority 19 in this case do not want to make any changes. They'd 20 like to just get this done as quickly as possible so 21 they can begin construction. 22 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: I'll move Item 1. ATTORNEY GENERAL CRIST: I'll second it. 23 GOVERNOR BUSH: I'm all for the Tri Delts. 24 There's a motion --25

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1 CFO GALLAGHER: They should have 80 students there 2 instead of only 73. GOVERNOR BUSH: That's a fraternity, not a 3 4 sorority. Sororities are much more dignified. There's 5 a motion and a second. Without objection, with heated 6 debate, it passes. 7 CFO GALLAGHER: I move to withdraw Item 2 and Item 8 3 from the agenda. 9 GOVERNOR BUSH: There's a motion. 10 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. GOVERNOR BUSH: And a second to withdraw Items 2 11 and 3. Without objection, the motions (sic) are 12 13 withdrawn. 14 MS. CASTILLE: Item 4, Destin West Marina 15 recommended consolidated intent for approval of an application for a five-year sovereignty submerged lands 16 lease for 348,637 square feet for an 89-slip 17 18 commercial, open to the public, marina. CFO GALLAGHER: Motion on 4. 19 20 ATTORNEY GENERAL CRIST: Second. 21 GOVERNOR BUSH: There's a motion and a second. No 22 discussion. No one wants to -- are there any speakers for any of these things? I feel very -- you don't have 23 24 to. It's about ready to pass unless you're opposed to 25 it.

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1 MS. CASTILLE: I think they're in favor of it. GOVERNOR BUSH: We need to find out who's speaking 2 3 before I --4 MS. CASTILLE: He simply wanted to thank you. 5 This is the applicant. 6 MR. TOLBERT: Mr. Governor and the Cabinet, I just 7 wanted to thank you for the privilege to stand before 8 you. 9 GOVERNOR BUSH: We haven't approved it yet. But you can thank us in advance. Please, go ahead. I 10 think you're okay, unless we say something really 11 stupid. 12 MR. TOLBERT: I'll wait for the approval for that 13 14 for sure. 15 GOVERNOR BUSH: There's a motion and a second. Any discussion? Without objection, the item passes. 16 17 Yes, sir. What can we do for you? 18 MR. TOLBERT: Mr. Governor and distinguished Cabinet, I just want to thank you today, and as a 19 20 lifetime Florida resident, I'm proud to offer a boating 21 slip to the general public, and I just want to thank 22 you. It's an honor to be before you today. Thank you. GOVERNOR BUSH: Thank you. Thanks for working 23 with us. Item 5? 24 25 MS. CASTILLE: Item 5 is Back Bay Improvement

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1 Group recommended consolidated intent for an authorization to modify an existing sovereignty 2 submerged land lease to change the use of the docking 3 4 facility from an open to the public, first come first 5 serve facility to a private docking facility. 6 This will reflect the change in ownership, reduce 7 the term from ten years to five years and increase the 8 preempted area by 14,000 square feet. It will also 9 allow the dredging of 908 yards of cubic material, and the docking facility will accommodate 49 vessels, 10 of 10 which will be on privately owned submerged lands by 11 12 virtue of a disclaimer on formerly conveyed submerged 13 lands. 14 CFO GALLAGHER: Motion on 5. ATTORNEY GENERAL CRIST: Second. 15 GOVERNOR BUSH: There's a motion and a second. 16 Are there any speakers? 17 18 MS. CASTILLE: No, sir. GOVERNOR BUSH: Without objection, the motion 19 20 passes. 21 MS. CASTILLE: Thank you, Governor, members of the 22 Cabinet. That concludes our agenda.
