2	(The agenda items commenced at 9:26 a.m.)
3	GOVERNOR CRIST: Our next Cabinet meeting will
4	be Tuesday, January the 15th, 2008.
5	We will take up the State Board of
6	Administration first, because I know General
7	Milligan has a travel commitment. General, good
8	morning, sir.
9	GENERAL MILLIGAN: Good morning, Governor.
10	GOVERNOR CRIST: How are you?
11	GENERAL MILLIGAN: I'm fine, thank you. This
12	is a tough act to follow, the Marine Corps.
13	GOVERNOR CRIST: Well, only you can do it.
14	You are Marine One.
15	GENERAL MILLIGAN: Well, you know, I get
16	really choked up when I see those young men and
17	women and the really super job they do every day in
18	support of our country and the freedoms we enjoy.
19	But I'm pleased to be here. This is my first
20	State Board of Administration meeting. And I would
21	like to, before I get to the agenda, just maybe
22	give you a little "how goes it" over the past five
23	days now that I've been dealing with this.
24	First of all, you asked, the Trustees asked
25	that we really look for a search for an

executive director, and we're in the process of pulling that together. We are talking to a number of search firms so we can do a really effective national search. We're rewriting the position description to really put more emphasis on that position description in the area of the investment side of the house, to really think of this executive director now as executive director, probably slant CIO, and really pump up that side of the responsibility.

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11 In reviewing what it might cost us to do it, 12 the mean for somebody in that position around the country is around 300 to \$350,000. I'm not asking 13 for any decision today, but just to give you a 14 15 heads-up. But I'll be coming back to you with what 16 that position description should look like and what 17 I think we ought to be willing to pay. And it's 18 important, of course, before we go to a search 19 group to be able to tell them what our salary range 20 is. We will also have a search committee, and I 21 22 anticipate recommending to you --23 GOVERNOR CRIST: Would you like a little 24 feedback on that? 25 GENERAL MILLIGAN: Sir?

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GOVERNOR CRIST: Would you like a little feedback on that?

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GENERAL MILLIGAN: Well, I would. 3 I'm 4 planning on submitting to you a recommendation that 5 will probably use three of the Trustees' persons 6 that are on the Investment Advisory Council, and 7 probably ask the director of the Division of Retirement to sit on it, and then I probably would 8 9 recommend that I chair it, try to keep it to about five people, maybe go as high as seven if there are 10 11 some particular folks that you might think would be 12 helpful to share the --13 GOVERNOR CRIST: Sure. I understand your call. I think the number is high, was my point. 14 15 GENERAL MILLIGAN: On the --16 GOVERNOR CRIST: Compensation. 17 GENERAL MILLIGAN: Well, I understand that. 18 GOVERNOR CRIST: It's a little high. 19 GENERAL MILLIGAN: I've already got some feedback. 20 21 GOVERNOR CRIST: I know it's Christmas and all 22 that. 23 GENERAL MILLIGAN: But, you know, I've got to 24 put out there what I think is important, and we'll work with that as we get closer. I anticipate the 25

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1	first part of the year to come back with really
2	solid recommendations on that.
3	GOVERNOR CRIST: Great.
4	GENERAL MILLIGAN: We are pushing very hard to
5	improve our communications, our ability to get out
6	with the public affairs side of the house. We're
7	already working on our website to make it more
8	friendly, user-friendly, and so there's a lot of
9	progress in that particular area.
10	We had a meeting which I attended. The
11	Standard & Poor's folks were in town meeting with
12	the BlackRock people and ourselves, and they have
13	prescribed some fairly stringent requirements in
14	terms of whoever we bring on board to follow on
15	with BlackRock. And we are moving forward with an
16	invitation to negotiate with a number of firms, and
17	we should have in place and ready for a
18	recommendation to you the follow-on to BlackRock
19	probably sometime toward the end of January.
20	One of the things that we've had to do to meet
21	Standard & Poor's requirements is, we've had to
22	shift two of the products that were in the pool or
23	in the A part of the pool to the B part, and shift
24	one item that was in the B pool into the A pool,
25	but the dollar values have remained the same. It

was an equal dollar tradeoff. Again, we are in a heavy process to go to an invitation to negotiate for the follow-on to BlackRock, and I plan on coming back to you with not just a follow-on to BlackRock as we know it today in managing the Local Government Investment Pool, but also an option to look at managing all of the short-term investments with an outside management operation. So we'll see where that leads, but I'll have that for you -we're working that during January, and I'll have it for you toward the end of January.

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12 I am working with the Audit Committee, met 13 with the chairman of the Audit Committee, and will 14 provide whatever support is necessary to help the 15 Audit Committee. One of the things that I think 16 they understand and I made clear to them, we do 17 not, SBA, want to be involved in that audit at all. 18 We will facilitate the acquiring of an appropriate 19 audit capability that will report directly to the 20 Audit Committee and support the Audit Committee. But I think the SBA has got to be out of it, and 21 22 it's got to be as open and in the sunshine as it 23 can be, and we don't need to have our fingerprints 24 on it at all other than to make sure they've got 25 the support they need.

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1	With that, sir, if you have no questions, I'll
2	get to the agenda. The first item is the request
3	for approval of the minutes of December 4, 2007.
4	ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move the
5	approval of the minutes.
6	GOVERNOR CRIST: I second it. It is done.
7	GENERAL MILLIGAN: The second item is request
8	approval of a fiscal sufficiency of an amount not
9	exceeding \$250 million State of Florida, Department
10	of Transportation Turnpike Revenue Bonds, Series
11	2008A.
12	ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 2,
13	Governor.
14	GOVERNOR CRIST: And I second it. Show it
15	approved without objection.
16	GENERAL MILLIGAN: You have been provided with
17	a copy of the update from BlackRock on the Local
18	Government Investment Pool. It is up on the
19	website for anybody that wishes to see it. I think
20	the most significant item in that report is that
21	yesterday we had more money coming into the pool
22	than going out of the pool.
23	GOVERNOR CRIST: That was a great day.
24	GENERAL MILLIGAN: That was a great day. It
25	is the first day that we've had a positive flow,

11 and I anticipate that over the next few weeks, I 1 think people will gain confidence and we will 2 3 begin, I hope, to see a strengthening of the pool 4 aqain. 5 That's a discussion item only. 6 Item 4 is a request for approval of the SBA 7 quarterly report required by the Protecting Florida's Investments Act. And basically, it 8 9 includes a list of scrutinized companies with activities in Sudan and Iran, and we are moving 10 11 along with that program quite expeditiously. We 12 have been cleaning up the numbers of companies that are involved. We've seen a slight drop in the 13 14 dollar value from about 1.27, I think, down to 15 about 1.23 billion. And we are on target, I 16 believe, to meet what is the ultimate goal date of 17 next September, but we are moving as expeditiously 18 as we can, but we need to be judicious as we move 19 these securities off of our rolls. 20 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: General, if I could ask a question. For those companies that 21 22 failed to respond in the 90-day period, I know they 23 have 12 months or whatever to move them into the

category where you sell those securities. But are you planning if they fail to respond to do

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something sooner than 12 months? That seems like an unnecessarily long period of time if they're not giving you any rationale why they shouldn't be removed.

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GENERAL MILLIGAN: Well, I don't think there's any intention to not move any of those prior to next September, but I think you have to look at when is it really the best time to sell that particular item. So it's the judiciousness of when you sell them that works in the best interest of the fund, really, of the State Board, of the fund.

ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Well, we certainly concur in that, but I just wanted to be sure we weren't going to intentionally wait 12 months to do it.

16 GENERAL MILLIGAN: No intention, General, to 17 hold back moving those items. It's just a question 18 of when is it most appropriate to do it.

19ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I would move Item20Number -- 4, is it?

GENERAL MILLIGAN: It is. It is.

22 GOVERNOR CRIST: I will second it, but I want 23 to comment too. I agree with General McCollum, 24 General. You know, this is a law that I feel very 25 strongly about and many of us feel very strongly

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1	about. It is intended to send a very clear message
2	about how Florida feels about these issues.
3	I know you understand all of this. I'm just
4	sharing this with the public at large, if you will,
5	and to Senator Deutch too, who worked very, very
6	hard on getting this passed. You know, the
7	statement it makes about how we feel and about
8	fundamental fairness and doing what's right and
9	standing up for it is really what this is about.
10	So let me also echo my colleague's comments.
11	And we know you're not holding back, but we need to
12	honor the law and honor the intent of the law as it
13	relates to its purpose, and we appreciate you
14	hearing it.
15	GENERAL MILLIGAN: The message is loud and
16	clear. Thank you.
17	GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you so much. It's
18	moved and seconded, and without objection, adopted.
19	Thank you.
20	GENERAL MILLIGAN: Thank you, sir. That's it.
21	GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you, General. Merry
22	Christmas to you. Happy holiday.
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14 1 GOVERNOR CRIST: Division of Bond Finance, Ben Watkins. Good morning, Ben. 2 3 MR. WATKINS: Good morning, Governor and 4 Cabinet members. Item 1 are the minutes, approval 5 of the minutes from the November 14th meeting. 6 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion on the 7 minutes? COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on the minutes. 8 9 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 10 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show the 11 minutes approved without objection. 12 MR. WATKINS: Item 2 is an authorizing resolution, a resolution authorizing the sale of up 13 14 to \$250 million in Turnpike Revenue Bonds. 15 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 2. 16 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. 17 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 18 approved without objection. 19 MR. WATKINS: Item 3 is a resolution 20 authorizing the issuance of up to \$650 million in 21 Lottery Revenue Bonds for the continued funding of 22 class size reduction. 23 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on Item 3. 24 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 25 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it

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approved without objection.

2 MR. WATKINS: Item Number 4 is a report of 3 award on the competitive sale of \$250 million in 4 Public Education Capital Outlay Bonds. The bonds were awarded to the low bidder at a true interest 5 6 cost of approximately 4.52 percent. 7 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 4. 8 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. 9 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show 10 Item 4 approved without objection. 11 MR. WATKINS: And lastly, Item 5 is a report 12 of award on the competitive sale of \$141.4 million 13 in Florida Forever Revenue Bonds for the continued 14 implementation of the Florida Forever program to 15 acquire conservation land. The bonds were awarded 16 to the low bidder at a true interest cost of 17 approximately 4.26 percent. 18 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on Item 5. 19 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 20 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 21 approved without objection. Ben, thank you. 22 MR. WATKINS: Thank you very much. 23 GOVERNOR CRIST: Happy holiday. 24 MR. WATKINS: Thank you, sir. 25

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1	GOVERNOR CRIST: Financial Services
2	Commission, Office of Insurance Regulation.
3	Commissioner McCarty, good morning, sir.
4	MR. McCARTY: Good morning, Governor.
5	GOVERNOR CRIST: How are you?
б	MR. McCARTY: Doing well, sir. How are you?
7	GOVERNOR CRIST: Good, thank you.
8	MR. McCARTY: The number 1 item is the good
9	morning.
10	ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Good morning.
11	MR. McCARTY: Approval of the publication for
12	proposed Rule 690-144.007. The purpose of this
13	draft rule is to implement changes to House Bill 1A
14	concerning collateralization for reinsurers. This
15	is an attempt to modernize our current process and
16	procedures for credit for reinsurance.
17	As you know, reinsurance is the insurance
18	companies buy to protect themselves from
19	catastrophic losses. Currently, under our Florida
20	rules, foreign reinsurers must post 100 percent
21	collateral in order for them to do business in
22	Florida. What this attempts to do is to modernize
23	that rule so for very strong, financially sound
24	companies, it would free them from having to
25	provide that 100 percent collateral and would

17 1 hopefully free up more capital in the worldwide 2 marketplace. 3 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Can I --4 GOVERNOR CRIST: Go ahead, General. I'm 5 sorry. 6 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Go ahead. You're 7 the Governor. GOVERNOR CRIST: That's okay. I just -- well, 8 9 all right. I'll put it out there. Sometimes 10 that's not always smart. But I was just -- I'm not 11 sure I understand, I guess is my point. Why would 12 we not want them to be 100 percent capitalized? MR. McCARTY: Well, there's two sets of rules, 13 14 and I would agree. There are two sets of rules. 15 There are those rules for those companies that are 16 licensed to do business in Florida or those that 17 are licensed in another state. 18 About 80 percent of our catastrophic 19 reinsurance is foreign, and under the current rules of the National Association of Insurance 20 Commissioners, if you're accredited or doing 21 22 business in the United States, you do not have to 23 post collateral, regardless of your financial 24 stability or strength. But if you're a foreign 25 company, regardless if that's a Lloyd's or a Munich

Re or a Swiss Re with billions of dollars in 1 2 capital, you have to post -- for every liability 3 you assume in Florida, you have to post a letter of 4 credit or collateral for that amount of money of 5 your exposure. Now, that's --6 GOVERNOR CRIST: Why is that not a good thing? 7 MR. McCARTY: Well, it would be a good thing 8 if you had the rules apply to everyone the same. 9 And the problem is that when you tie up that much capital, there's that much less capital that will 10 11 be available to provide for additional coverage for 12 other risks. So for every dollar of risk that is in Florida, they have a dollar in collateral. 13 But 14 that only applies to foreign reinsurers. That does 15 not apply. So what we're trying to do is create a 16 level playing field so that companies that are 17 strong, viable, financially sound reinsurance 18 companies that do global reinsurance, well known 19 reinsurance names --20 GOVERNOR CRIST: So you're trying to create 21 more competition? 22 MR. McCARTY: Yes, sir. 23 GOVERNOR CRIST: I got it. 24 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Governor --25 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Well --

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GOVERNOR CRIST: General first, then Commissioner.

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ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Well, I was just 3 4 going to say that I think this is a good proposal 5 based on what you've explained and what I 6 understand it is, but I am still concerned with the 7 foreign reinsurers in terms of their transparency. Many of them are abroad, they're in the Bahamas, 8 9 they're elsewhere, and I don't know if you're looking into the prospects of getting them or 10 11 requiring them to provide more data on their 12 profits, how they're making money, what their rate of return is, in addition to just the information 13 14 we generally get about the guality of what they're 15 doing. And I would hope, Kevin, that you would do 16 that.

You're giving them the opportunity to do business here. We want them to do business. But they don't come under the same rules in other ways that American companies do. So can you assure us that your office is in the future going to proceed to give us more transparency on these companies' business?

24 MR. McCARTY: Right. We're in the drafting 25 process of this rule, and we're working with our

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colleagues to bring more transparency in this process. And I would agree with you, General, that overall, the transparency in American companies is much greater than you would see, particularly those companies in Europe. But as a term and condition of receiving this credit, we will certainly make that part of our regulatory framework.

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ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Well, I know the Commissioner wants to ask a question, but in due course, I will move this. But --

GOVERNOR CRIST: Commissioner.

12 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Well, thank you, 13 Governor and General. You know, I want to make sure here that -- for some of the same reasons the 14 15 General mentioned, that we're not putting ourselves 16 from the reinsurers' standpoint and transparency 17 out there, that we're not doing in this vein the 18 same thing that we got caught up in in the subprime 19 mortgage situation, where everybody thought 20 everything was just fine until they started asking the right questions and found out maybe we were 21 22 overextended a little bit. And I'm not sure 23 whether we can get our hands around foreign 24 investors quite as -- foreign companies quite as 25 well as we can get our hands around state and U.S.

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Government firms.

2 So I'm very cautious here myself, because I 3 don't want us to get into the same type of 4 situation on the reinsurer side that we've gotten 5 in on our financial. You know, everybody loves to 6 make that high profit, but all of a sudden that 7 high profit doesn't look so good, and you've got some situations that don't look good at all if you 8 9 dig deep enough, and I want to make sure we protect ourselves. So I agree with the General. 10 We need 11 to be very careful here. 12 GOVERNOR CRIST: I would agree. But I would 13 like to add -- I have a question, I quess, 14 Commissioner. U.S. reinsurance companies 15 currently, they do not have to 100 percent 16 capitalize; is that correct? 17 MR. McCARTY: Yes, sir, that is correct. 18 GOVERNOR CRIST: So this offers, as you put it 19 very well, a level playing field for some other 20 companies to compete on an equal footing for Florida customers? 21 22 MR. McCARTY: Yes, sir. And I'm cognizant of 23 the issues that have been raised by Commissioner 24 Bronson. We would require companies to subject 25 themselves to the jurisdiction of Florida courts.

We will proceed very cautiously. Again, we're not expanding this very broadly. We're looking at companies that are well known names, that have established reputations, that have had relationships with Florida companies for many, many years. As I like to emphasize, most of our reinsurance is offshore today, so the more that we can do to untrap capital that's currently there, I think it's better for markets.

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GOVERNOR CRIST: And let me offer a little 10 11 more support for what you're trying to do. Some of 12 these U.S. companies have not been very good to 13 Florida, and we know the names of them. I won't 14 embarrass them today. Maybe later. But just 15 because they may be a U.S.-based company doesn't 16 give me the assurance that they have a good ethic 17 about how they do business with our people. So, 18 you know, expanding competition I think is a very 19 good thing. And, General, if you're reading to 20 make a motion --21 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 1. 22 MR. McCARTY: Thank you. 23 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: And I'll second it. 24 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 25 approved without objection.

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1	MR. McCARTY: And we will proceed with	
2	caution, Governor.	
3	GOVERNOR CRIST: Oh, I know.	
4	MR. McCARTY: Thank you.	
5	GOVERNOR CRIST: But also get her done. Thank	
б	you very much. Happy holidays.	
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1	GOVERNOR CRIST: Lisa, Department of Revenue.
2	Good morning.
3	MS. ECHEVERRI: Good morning.
4	GOVERNOR CRIST: How are you?
5	MS. ECHEVERRI: I'm good. How are you?
б	GOVERNOR CRIST: Great, thanks.
7	MS. ECHEVERRI: Item 1 is
8	COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Excuse me.

23	ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I'll move the
24	minutes.
25	GOVERNOR CRIST: It makes us feel good to do

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1	that.
2	COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second.
3	MS. ECHEVERRI: For the meeting of November
4	14, 2007.
5	GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it
6	approved without objection. Thank you.
7	MS. ECHEVERRI: Item 2 requests approval of
8	rule amendments. This is actually the adoption of
9	the revised communications services tax form. We
10	revised this form frequently to update it for new
11	rates and new jurisdictions, so we recommend
12	approval of Item 2.
13	COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on Item 2.
14	ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second.
15	GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it
16	approved without objection.
17	MS. ECHEVERRI: We request approval of Item 3.
18	Item 3 are rule amendments related to our corporate
19	income tax returns. We are adding provisions for
20	electronic signatures. We recommend approval of
21	Item 3.
22	ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 3.
23	COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second.
24	GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it
25	approved without objection.

1 MS. ECHEVERRI: Item 4, we are requesting 2 approval of rule amendments. These amendments will 3 repeal provisions of the intangible tax that were 4 repealed by the Legislature effective January 1, 5 2007. The amendments also reorganize those rules 6 for the remaining provisions that are still in 7 effect. COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on Item 4. 8 9 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 10 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 11 approved without objection. MS. ECHEVERRI: Finally, we request approval 12 13 of Item 5. Item 5 are rule amendments. These are 14 statutory changes expanding an exemption for 15 certain advertising materials that were adopted by 16 the Legislature. Recommend approval. 17 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 5. 18 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. 19 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 20 approved without objection. Happy holidays. 21 MS. ECHEVERRI: Thank you. Merry Christmas. 22 GOVERNOR CRIST: You too. 23 24 25

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1	is an informational item. It is the fifth and last
2	specialty plate passed in the 2007 legislative
3	session, and it states, "Protect Florida Springs."
4	The proceeds
5	GOVERNOR CRIST: Good idea.
6	MS. KORST: The proceeds support the Wildlife
7	Foundation of Florida and will be used for
8	community-based springs research, education, and
9	outreach and springs conservation.
10	Please join me in recognizing representatives
11	from the Wildlife Foundation of Florida. Please
12	stand as your name is called. Daniel Bourg, donor
13	relations manager. Cindy Taylor, director of the

23	cooperatively to protect Florida's springs and to
24	provide much needed research about these great
25	areas in Florida. Thank you.

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1	GOVERNOR CRIST: Of course. Thank you. Are
2	you going to get a go ahead.
3	MS. KORST: That concludes the Department's
4	agenda items.
5	GOVERNOR CRIST: Are you going to get a
б	picture?
7	MS. KORST: Yes, please.
8	GOVERNOR CRIST: Would you like a picture?
9	Okay.
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30 1 GOVERNOR CRIST: Board of Trustees, Secretary 2 Sole. Good morning, Secretary. How are you? 3 MR. SOLE: Governor and Cabinet, good morning. 4 GOVERNOR CRIST: Great day vesterday. 5 MR. SOLE: Yes, sir. 6 GOVERNOR CRIST: Thanks for your tremendous 7 work on the water issue between Florida and Alabama 8 and Georgia. MR. SOLE: I truly am grateful for your 9 10 leadership on that issue, Governor. That worked 11 out well. 12 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: But before you get started, Mike, I've got something to point out, 13 14 Governor, because we just did a license plate about 15 protecting Florida's springs, and I gather that you 16 have some at least optimistic good news about Weeki 17 Wachee Springs. I understand we might be along the 18 way where we can't nail it quite yet, but you're 19 close to acquiring that for the Park Service. And 20 that's kind of exciting to me, since I grew up in that county and know quite a bit about that spring. 21 22 So why don't you tell us about what has happened 23 this week? 24 MR. SOLE: General, thank you. Today, or 25 actually yesterday, we received a letter of intent

from Weeki Wachee which agrees basically to convert Weeki Wachee to a state park and donate that park, or donate that facility to the State. It is subject to some ongoing negotiations with the Southwest Florida Water Management District, but clearly, this is a great opportunity not only for Florida state parks, but the local area as well, to help continue to operate that historical facility in a great way.

ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Well, it's a big 10 11 springs. I'm sure, Governor, you and the 12 Commissioner are aware that it's one of the great natural wonders of Florida and has been around for 13 14 a long time as a tourist attraction, but has not 15 been managed particularly the way we would like. 16 In the last few years, it went through -- I think 17 ABC at one time owned it, and it provided water for 18 the City of St. Petersburg, which I think is your 19 hometown.

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GOVERNOR CRIST: It is.

ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: But it's a beautiful river that comes out of it. And I just commend you for the work you've been doing on that and keep my fingers crossed that we do complete this and that your work with the water management

32 1 districts resolve whatever those issues are and we 2 get to execute on that letter of intent. 3 GOVERNOR CRIST: Yes, that's great. That's 4 great. MR. SOLE: And General, I do thank you for 5 6 your leadership on this as well. This has been 7 three years of ongoing discussions, and hopefully, 8 again cross our fingers, we can bring this to a 9 resolution. 10 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I was glad to play 11 a small role in that, but it's you all who did it, 12 so I'm just aware of it because of some of the 13 negotiations. 14 MR. SOLE: Thank you. 15 GOVERNOR CRIST: Are we going to keep the 16 mermaids? MR. SOLE: Yes, sir. 17 18 GOVERNOR CRIST: Excellent. That's great. 19 MR. SOLE: We'll need to create a new position 20 title, though. 21 GOVERNOR CRIST: Okay. What? No, we have to 22 stop. This is going down a bad slope. Please 23 continue the agenda. MR. SOLE: Item Number 1, Governor. 24 25 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: You can go down

33 1 and swim with the mermaids. GOVERNOR CRIST: No, no, no. I'll let you do 2 3 that, General. Item 1. 4 MR. SOLE: Item Number 1, the Department requests withdrawal of this item. 5 6 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion to 7 withdraw? 8 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Move withdrawal. 9 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 10 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 11 withdrawn without objection. 12 Thank you. Item Number 2 is MR. SOLE: 13 consideration of an application for a five-year 14 sovereignty submerged lease to ECAA, LLC. This is 15 for a 84-slip commercial marina located on the 16 St. Johns River in Clay County. It's technically a 17 redevelopment of a previous marina, and the project 18 meets all the Department and Board rules and 19 requirements. 20 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Move it. 21 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion? 22 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move it. 23 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 24 25 approved without objection.

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1	MR. SOLE: Thank you. Item Number 3 is
2	consideration of an application for a five-year
3	sovereignty submerged land lease to Harborwalk, LLC
4	for a 100-slip mixed use commercial marina located
5	in Destin Harbor, Okaloosa County. This lease will
6	modify and combine two previous Board leases and
7	also meets all Board and DEP rules.
8	COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on Item 3.
9	ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second.
10	GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show
11	Item 3 approved without objection.
12	MR. SOLE: Thank you. Item Number 4 is
13	consideration of an option agreement to acquire
14	from CSX 12.22 acres of abandoned rail corridor
15	which extends through the downtown Gainesville
16	area. This trail will connect to an existing
17	22-mile trail network, including the
18	Gainesville-Hawthorne Trail. The purchase price of
19	this acquisition is 1,745,000, which is 100 percent
20	of the approved value. And funding for trail
21	development, the City has already secured almost
22	\$2 million to improve the trail and develop it.
23	And with that, I would like to recognize Mayor
24	Hanrahan, the mayor of Gainesville.
25	GOVERNOR CRIST: Madam Mayor, good morning.

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How are you? This sounds pretty cool.

MS. HANRAHAN: It's very cool, very cool. Thank you, Governor Crist, and thank you, General McCollum and Commissioner Bronson. I'm very pleased to be here this morning.

And I want to indicate to you how very important this trail is to us by letting you know who we have with us. First, our police chief, Norm Botsford, is here. Chief Botsford. Captain Rick Hannah, Sergeant Art Adkins, and Teresa Scott, who is our public works director.

12 And I really want to recognize each of you and your wonderful staff for quiding us through this 13 14 process. Believe it or not, it's a very 15 complicated project, and so it has taken almost 10 16 It's probably a record for the poor Office years. 17 of Greenways and Trails, who have been working 18 their hearts out to make it happen. And it was 19 really the Trust for Public Land that swooped in 20 and helped us in our relationship with CSX and worked through some very complicated issues, which 21 22 I won't bore you with.

23 But it's been a very exciting project. It's 24 about -- just over two miles long. It's along 25 Sixth Street, which, as a Gator, General, you know,

is -- it's really right between the edge of the University of Florida campus and the downtown, and it really needs to bring together those two areas. It's an area that's in need of redevelopment. It goes right by Santa Fe Community College, along the edge of the college, and we have a number of projects under construction.

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8 And then just to put it in a big context, it 9 connects to our regional trail network, which I know the Office of Greenways and Trails is working 10 11 very hard on. This trail connects to the Depot 12 Trail, which connects to the Gainesville-Hawthorne 13 Trail, and also connects to the Waldo Trail. Now, 14 the Depot Trail will eventually connect to the 15 Archer Trail, and then those will connect to some 16 trails further out. So through this project, you 17 can bring all of North-Central Florida together 18 through rail trails.

19And with that, I'll be happy to answer any20questions, and I want to again thank each of you21and wish you a very happy Christmas.

22 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on Item 4. 23 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Well, I will 24 second it, but I want to also make a comment, if I 25 could. I have a former classmate in the mayor, but

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37 your iteration of the various trails it connects to 1 reminds of that movie about one bone connected to 2 3 the other bone. I was getting really into the 4 swing of things here this morning. 5 GOVERNOR CRIST: Get it going. 6 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: But, yes, I am a 7 Gator, and I do know this area very well, and I think it will be a tremendous addition to our trail 8 9 system. He's a great Floridian and a great American 20 and has represented Florida very, very well. MS. HANRAHAN: Well, I have a Tim Tebow story. 21 22 GOVERNOR CRIST: Okay. 23 MS. HANRAHAN: You know, like you, Governor 24 Crist, my husband, he has only one flaw, which is 25 that he went to Florida State.

HANRAHAN: Well, we've really worked hard 4 5 to bring together lots of partners, Governor. 6 GOVERNOR CRIST: I know. Congratulations. 7 Happy Christmas to you and your family. 8 So we moved it, we seconded it, and it's 9 approved without objection. 10 MR. SOLE: Thank you, Governor. Item number 11 5, the Department is requesting withdrawal of this 12 item. 13 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Move to withdraw. 14 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 15 GOVERNOR CRIST: Show it withdrawn without 16 objection. MR. SOLE: Our last item, Item Number 6 is 17 18 consideration to authorize the secretary of the 19 Department or a designee to negotiate a new lease 20 with Miami-Dade County to provide for workforce 21 housing. 22 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 6. 23 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 24 25 approved without objection.

MR. SOLE: Governor and Cabinet, thank you. GOVERNOR CRIST: Secretary, thank you. Thank you again very much for your great work yesterday and great work all year. And before we all leave, and I want to wish you a very happy holiday, a very merry Christmas, and I want to thank our staff publicly for the great work that you do. You make us really look good up here, but it's really your great work that does that, and we are most appreciative and grateful for it. Thank you so much. (Proceedings concluded at 9:59 p.m.)
