1 Item 3 is a resolution -- are MR. WATKINS: resolutions authorizing the issuance and 2 3 competitive or negotiated sale of up to \$46 million 4 of capital outlay refunding bonds. These bonds 5 would be used to achieve debt service savings 6 because of lower interest rates. Should the 7 prevailing market rates at the time that we sell the capital outlay bonds -- if it would give us 8 9 debt service savings, we'll execute the refunding 10 as well. 11 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Move Item 3. 12 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. 13 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 14 approved without objection. 15 MR. WATKINS: And Item Number 4 is a 16 resolution authorizing the competitive or 17 negotiated sale of up to \$154,695,000 in Lottery revenue bonds. This is the final piece of the 18 19 outstanding authorization for bonds to finance 20 school construction for class size reduction. This 21 brings the total debt used to finance school 22 construction for class size reduction to 23 approximately \$2.4 billion that we've executed over 24 the last five years or so. 25 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion on Item 4?

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1 GOVERNOR CRIST: Office of Insurance 2 Regulation. Commissioner McCarty. 3 MR. McCARTY: Good morning, Governor. 4 GOVERNOR CRIST: How are you? 5 MR. McCARTY: Doing well, sir. Thank you. 6 Good morning, members of the Commission. 7 Agenda Item 1 is to request for adoption, for final adoption of proposed standard risk rates. 8 9 The Office is required under the Florida Insurance 10 Code to conduct an annual survey for determining 11 the standard risk rates. The standard risk rates is the average charged by the individual market 12 from all carriers. The standard risk rates are 13 then used to establish the maximum that can be 14 15 charged for conversion policies, which is 16 200 percent of the standard risk rate. The current rates that are in effect include a 17 18 company that has been suspended in the State of 19 Florida and is in receivership. By removing those 20 from determining these rates, you actually reduce 21 The Office proposes the adoption of the the rates. 22 standard risk rates without the inclusion of the 23 suspended company. 24 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion? 25 CFO SINK: Move it.

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9 1 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved. Is there a second? 2 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. 3 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 4 approved without objection. 5 MR. McCARTY: Agenda Item Number 2 is a 6 request for publication of Proposed Rule 690-189 on 7 workers' compensation for the application and audit procedures. Pursuant to Chapter 440, the Financial 8 9 Services Commission is to promulgate rules that affect the application for workers' comp coverage 10 11 and for audits and payroll classification of 12 workers. This rule is based on a submission by the 13 14 NCCI, National Council on Compensation Insurance, 15 which does rating and data collection. It's also 16 the State contractual statistical agent for 17 workers' compensation. The proposed rule is twofold. One is to allow 18 19 for electronic signatures so long as in compliance 20 with Florida law; and number two, it raises the

20 with Fiolida Taw, and humber two, it failes the 21 threshold for onsite audits from 5,000 in premium 22 to 10,000. These audits will still be conducted, 23 but the audits will be moved from 5,000 to 10,000 24 for onsite, and they'll do mail or desk audits for 25 those under 10,000.

10 1 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Move Item 2. 2 CFO SINK: Second. GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 3 4 approved without objection. 5 MR. McCARTY: Agenda Item Number 3 is a 6 request for approval for publication of Proposed 7 Rule 690-156, Part 1, specific requirements under the federal Medicare supplement insurance. 8 This 9 rule implements Florida requirements for federal 10 legislation regarding medical sup policies. 11 The Congress enacted two bills, the Medicare 12 Improvements for Patients and Providers Act of 2008, known as MIPPA, and the Genetic Information 13 Nondiscrimination Act of 2008. States are required 14 15 to implement these new standards by September 24, 16 2009, in order maintain authority over the Medigap program in their state. 17 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion on Item 3? 18 19 CFO SINK: Move it. 20 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 21 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 22 approved without objection. 23 Thank you very much, Commissioner. 24 MR. McCARTY: Thank you, Governor. Thank you, 25 members of the Commission.

11 1 GOVERNOR CRIST: Agency for Enterprise 2 Information Technology, Dave Taylor. Good morning, 3 Dave. 4 MR. TAYLOR: Good morning, Governor. Good morning, Cabinet. We have two items today. First, 5 6 we respectfully request approval of the minutes of 7 January 27, 2009. CFO SINK: Move it. 8 9 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. 10 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show the minutes approved without objection. 11 12 MR. TAYLOR: Thank you. The next item is, we 13 respectfully request adoption and approval to file 14 a new rule relating to delegation of authority. 15 This rule establishes the delegation of authority from the Governor and Cabinet to the executive 16 17 director of the Agency for Enterprise Information 18 Technology for those duties and responsibilities 19 outlined in Chapter 14 and Chapter 282, as well as 20 those related to the day-to-day administration of 21 this new agency. 22 CFO SINK: I move it. 23 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 24 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 25 approved without objection. Thank you, Dave.

1 GOVERNOR CRIST: Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Commissioner Bailey. Good morning, 2 3 Commissioner. How are you? 4 MR. BAILEY: Good morning, Governor and 5 Cabinet. We have three items on the agenda this 6 morning. The first is the minutes of our March 10 7 Cabinet meeting. GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion on the 8 9 minutes? 10 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on Item 1. 11 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 12 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show the 13 minutes approved without objection. MR. BAILEY: The second item is our 14 15 performance report and purchases over \$100,000 for 16 the third quarter. During this quarter, I trust 17 you've seen that our performance remained strong 18 over all the key issues. 19 I do want to bring one issue to your 20 attention. Because of the budget challenges that have been not just facing FDLE, but facing local 21 22 law enforcement, we are looking at ways to re-engineer some of our services. A prime example 23 24 is our electronic surveillance support teams that 25 we've now installed in four regions.

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This concept originated in Orlando, where the law enforcement resources were being severely taxed by violent crime. Many of these violent criminals were both elusive and mobile. And the cutting edge surveillance equipment is expensive, and top-notch surveillance and tracking expertise was at a premium.

8 The solution was a multi-agency team to 9 approach this by pooling both equipment and 10 manpower. And while the technology is law 11 enforcement sensitive, I can say that what we have 12 there in place now is state-of-the-art, and it's 13 allowing to us stay ahead of this particular breed 14 of mobile criminal.

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15 So far these teams have conducted 450 16 missions, and they resulted in the arrest of over 250 violent criminals. Because of the success of 17 18 this concept, they have been -- these four teams have been nominated for the International 19 20 Association of Chiefs of Police award for 21 excellence in criminal investigation and our 2.2 Department's superior unit designation. 23 I would be happy to answer any question on any other aspects of Item 2. 24 25 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 2.

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COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second.

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GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it approved. Show it approved, excuse me, without objection.

MR. BAILEY: Our last item is a notice on proposed rule changes. Six of these have to do with the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission, one with our information program. They will be published in the Administrative Weekly on June 26, and if all goes as we expect, I'll be bringing it back for your approval at the August 25 Cabinet meeting.

13 Because this process is just beginning, I will 14 defer giving a lot of details unless you have 15 specific questions on these proposed rule changes. 16 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on Item 3. 17 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 18 19 approved without objection. 20 CFO SINK: Governor? 21 GOVERNOR CRIST: Yes, CFO. 22 CFO SINK: Can I just make a comment? 23 GOVERNOR CRIST: Please. 24 CFO SINK: I hope this is right, Commissioner 25 Bailey, but as part of your report, I just wanted

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to point out that I was struck by this positively, so relax, by this report that the -- we've had a lot of conversation about the Public Assistance Fraud Unit, because in the difficult priority setting that we've all had to go through for the last two years, that was one of your units that was potentially going to get some pretty severe cuts.

8 But according to my information, last quarter, 9 they've almost doubled the number of cases that 10 they've been able to investigate. And my 11 information said that almost \$11 million in 12 fraudulent benefits that would have been disbursed 13 were not because of the action of this particular 14 investigation unit.

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And I just want to encourage you to keep encouraging them, because we know that there are millions and millions of dollars of fraud embedded in the public assistance system that need to be addressed. And please convey my thanks to the people in the unit.

21 MR. BAILEY: I will. And if I may, I will 22 comment that not only have those cases increased in 23 number, but they've increased in the quality of the 24 cases. As you mentioned, they're bringing in more 25 money.

That is one of the things that, as you know, 1 was an issue during the session. However, there 2 3 were no losses there. But we are doing some 4 re-engineering there, where we're going to 5 consolidate intake, which we think will even make 6 it more efficient. 7 CFO SINK: Thank you. 8 GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you. General. 9 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: As you know, Governor, Commissioner Bailey's Florida Department 10 11 of Law Enforcement officers do most of the 12 investigations for our Office of Statewide 13 Prosecution. And mortgage fraud is a big part of 14 that, and you've spent a lot of energy on that, and 15 it has been very successful. 16 But I want to particularly highlight the investigation that resulted in the arrest of 18 17 18 members of the Westside Gang down in Orlando. You 19 mentioned the gang violence there a few minutes 20 ago. This occurred just a couple of weeks ago. That was a huge gang takedown, and our office will 21 22 be prosecuting those 18 members. 23 But the law enforcement work was done and the 24 coordination of that by your office. And it's just 25 one example of many unheralded moments where the

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1 team over there that you have gets out there in the 2 field and really produces the protective efforts for our state citizens deserve, so we want to thank 3 4 you for that. 5 I just wanted to highlight for the Cabinet 6 that particular arrest, because that was a big 7 arrest. That was a big gang takedown. MR. BAILEY: Well, I don't have to tell you, 8 9 those are very long-running, meticulously investigated cases. They take a lot of resources 10 11 and a lot of manpower. But we see that that's one 12 of the prime reasons that our department has been 13 created, is that type of long-range, complex, 14 high-level case. 15 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Well, we really 16 appreciate it. And again, thank you for the 17 service of the many men and women that don't get 18 acknowledged every day. 19 MR. BAILEY: Thank you. 20 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Thank you, 21 Governor. 22 GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you, General. 23 Commissioner. 24 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Thank you, Governor. 25 Commissioner Bailey, let me publicly thank you

and your staff for helping us get out of a real tight fix on our applications for gun permits. Governor, we were very concerned that we would accidentally have to under law give a license to someone who did not qualify. Commissioner Bailey has put a number of people to help us certify the background checks so that we don't make a mistake and give a permit to somebody who does not quality under the laws of the State of Florida to have a concealed weapons permit.

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11 We have over 600,000 weapons permit holders in 12 the State of Florida. Let me say, because of the efforts of FDLE, we have had very few incidents of 13 14 anyone misusing their authority to carry a 15 concealed weapon in the State of Florida because of 16 these background checks to make sure that the 17 public is secure and safe. They have done that. Ι 18 think people have shown that they will responsibly 19 carry a weapon for their self-protection for 20 various reasons and not misuse that authority. And on behalf of our Department, thank you 21 22 very much for all your effort. 23 MR. BAILEY: Thank you for your comments. 24 GOVERNOR CRIST: I think there may have been a 25 line item veto that may have helped, \$6 million

19 1 worth, for your agency too. And you're welcome. 2 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: And let me publicly 3 thank you, Governor, for that. 4 GOVERNOR CRIST: You're guite welcome. I'm 5 happy to do it. It was an honor. 6 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: I appreciate the help 7 in that, simply because, as you know, and what most people didn't know and they were wondering why the 8 9 Governor would take such an effort to veto that, those licenses now will be a seven-year license, 10 11 and so the amount of money coming in after this 12 flush of permitting is going to get very slim after 13 we catch up. Hopefully we catch up. But the money 14 coming in to support the whole organization of 15 concealed weapons investigations for those who may 16 violate and those types of things will be very 17 short over the next seven years, and we appreciate 18 that veto. 19 GOVERNOR CRIST: Well, thank you for the 20 letter regarding it. I appreciate that, 21 Commissioner. 22 Commissioner, thank you very much. 23 MR. BAILEY: Thank you. Good morning. 24 25

GOVERNOR CRIST: Administration Commission, 1 2 Lisa Saliba. Good morning, Lisa. How are you? 3 MS. SALIBA: Good morning, Governor and 4 members of the Commission. 5 Today we have one agenda item. We present for 6 your consideration a recommended order issued in 7 the proceeding of the Department of Community Affairs and listed parties vs. the City of 8 9 Jacksonville and listed parties. At issue is a future land use amendment to the City of 10 11 Jacksonville's Comprehensive Plan, as well as a 12 text amendment. 13 We have representatives of the parties here 14 They're available to answer questions. We today. 15 are not scheduling them to speak. But they are 16 Shaw Stiller, the general counsel of the Department 17 of Community Affairs, Shannon Eller representing 18 the City of Jacksonville, and Gary Sams 19 representing M.D. Moody & Sons. The first order of business for the Commission 20 is enter a memo into the record that addresses an 21 22 ex parte communication in the proceeding. We understand the Commission members themselves did 23 24 not read the memo. However, there were several 25 staff that did, and we ask for your approval to

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21 1 enter that document into the record. GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion? 2 3 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: So move. COMMISSIONER BRONSON: 4 Second. 5 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 6 approved without objection. 7 MS. SALIBA: The second order of business, 8 staff requests authorization to enter the Second 9 Amended Draft Final Order finding the map amendment 10 not in compliance and the text amendment in 11 compliance. 12 The parties listed that we discussed earlier 13 have agreed to the contents of the final order as 14 well as remedial and other actions listed. We also 15 are recommending sanctions in the event of 16 noncompliance. 17 If you have any questions at this time, we would be happy to take those. 18 19 GOVERNOR CRIST: Any questions? MS. SALIBA: And we ask for your approval of 20 21 the Second Amended Draft Final Order. 22 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I would move the 23 approval. 24 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. 25 CFO SINK: Second.

WILHELM: Good morning, Governor and Cabinet. 5 6 Item Number 1, staff is requesting the Board 7 of Trustees to adopt the proposed amendments to 8 Chapter 18-21 to give permission for staff to 9 publish the notice of change and to authorize the 10 Commissioner of Agriculture to submit on behalf of the Board the certification documents to the 11 12 Secretary of State. 13 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion on Item 1? 14 CFO SINK: Move it. 15 COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second. 16 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 17 approved without objection. 18 Thank you very much. MR. WILHELM: 19 GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you very much. 20 21 22 23 24 25

24 1 GOVERNOR CRIST: Board of Trustees, Secretary Sole. Good morning, Mike. How are you? 2 MR. SOLE: Good morning, Governor and Cabinet. 3 4 I'm doing well this morning. 5 GOVERNOR CRIST: Good. 6 MR. SOLE: Item Number 1 is submittal of the minutes from the April 14, 2009 Cabinet meeting. 7 CFO SINK: Move it. 8 9 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 10 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 11 approved without objection. 12 MR. SOLE: Thank you. Item Number 2 is a request for consideration of an option agreement to 13 acquire almost 1,400 acres in Santa Rosa County. 14 15 This is near the City of Milton and is within the 16 Clear Creek/Whiting Field Florida Forever project. 17 It's an A list project. Acquisition is from the Nature Conservancy, and the consideration is for 18 19 \$5.1 million. 20 I do want to brag a little bit about this 21 acquisition, if you'll let me, Governor. 22 GOVERNOR CRIST: Please do. 23 MR. SOLE: One, I want to give great kudos to, 24 Commissioner, your staff in the Division of 25 Forestry. They have negotiated and organized this

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acquisition in a great way.

We have several partners for this acquisition. \$1.2 million of the Off-Highway Vehicle Fund is going to be used as part of this acquisition to actually develop on 620 acres an off-highway vehicle site. That's seriously needed for this region, because we don't have any established off-highway vehicle opportunities, recreational opportunities west of the Apalachicola River.

In addition, we also have a partner with the 10 11 U.S. Navy. The U.S. Navy has agreed to contribute 12 some 25 percent of this, which is \$1.275 million, 13 as part of their effort to ensure adequate buffering to the Navy facilities within the region. 14 15 This has been a great partnership with the Navy. 16 We have a longstanding MOU with the Navy on how we 17 do this. And this is also something that I think 18 is very important to them, as it is to the people 19 of Florida.

Finally, the rest of this acquisition will be
funded out of the Inholdings and Additions Fund
within the Division of Forestry.

23 We have Commander Vincent here with the U.S. 24 Navy here to speak, I think, in support. And I'm 25 not sure if Commissioner Salter was able to attend.

I'll just read 7 the ending of it. "Naval Air Station Whiting Field enjoys a 8 9 tremendous relationship with the State of Florida, 10 Santa Rosa County, the Nature Conservancy, and the 11 Division of Forestry in its continued efforts to 12 encourage compatible land development and 13 encroachment partnering initiatives. The 14 established agreements and statutes allow for such 15 cooperation to share in the acquisition of 16 environmentally sensitive tracts for conservation 17 purposes." 18 There's that part. The other part, sir, we started business in 1943, so we've been forging 19 20 wings for the fleet for about 66 years now. We put about 700 a year out there. Just for a point of 21 22 reference, if you see a Navy, Marine, or Coast 23 Guard helicopter pilot out there, they got their 24 wings at NAS Whiting Field. And without these 25 partnerships that I mentioned and the Commissioner

28 1 mentioned, we cannot continue our mission. Sixty-five percent of all naval aviators -- as 2 3 a matter of fact, 20 years ago, I was a student at 4 NAS Whiting Field. Sixty-five percent of all naval aviators start flying, learn how to fly airplanes 5 6 at Whiting. This is a huge, huge win for us, and I 7 appreciate your considerations. 8 GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you, Commander. Ι 9 appreciate your being here. 10 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item --11 CFO SINK: Governor --12 GOVERNOR CRIST: I was going to move Item 2, 13 that's all. I think we're running a little ahead of 18 schedule. 19 I'm aware that the representatives of the 20 Nature Conservancy are here, and they've also been 21 integral partners. And maybe Debbie Keller or Andy 22 McLeod -- because this is part of a bigger picture 23 of this partnership that has been developed. It's 24 not just this one project. It's --25 MR. SOLE: I agree.

CFO SINK: And I would like to give them the opportunity to give us an idea of what the bigger picture is of all the work that they've been doing for seven or eight years now.

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MR. McLEOD: Thank you very much, CFO Sink. I'm Andy McLeod, Director of Government Affairs for the Florida Chapter of the Nature Conservancy.

And you are correct. This is part of a 8 9 national relationship that the Nature Conservancy has with DOD working on base buffering across the 10 11 country in many different states. I would defer to 12 my colleague, Callie DeHaven, who has worked specifically with the military in the Panhandle on 13 14 a number of different projects, buffering several 15 facilities.

GOVERNOR CRIST: Good morning.

MS. DEHAVEN: Thank you. Good morning.

18 I've got a big plan and big picture here that we can put up on the map. And we're so thankful 19 for all the partners that worked on this, Santa 20 Rosa County, the military, the Nature Conservancy, 21 22 just very grateful for the support and all the 23 continued work in this area. Division of Forestry, 24 just a wonderful partner to work with. Thank you 25 so much.

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1 MS. KELLER: I'm Deborah Keller. I work with 2 the Department of Defense throughout the State of 3 Florida. And I wanted to mention that the 4 Department has been an incredible partner to the 5 environment, not just for buffering projects, but 6 also on how they manage this land. And so I think 7 it's important that we look at them not only as someone who can help us protect land from future 8 9 development and make sure that it buffers their 10 activities and creates corridors for conservation, 11 but also how they will take care of that land and 12 work with the surrounding neighborhoods and 13 landowners to make sure that that land stays viable 14 for the ecology for future generations. Thank you. 15 GOVERNOR CRIST: Any other comments? 16 MR. SOLE: Did we vote? ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Well, we moved it. 17 18 GOVERNOR CRIST: We moved it. 19 CFO SINK: And it was seconded. 20 GOVERNOR CRIST: And got a second. It's 21 approved without objection. 22 MR. SOLE: Thank you, Governor. 23 GOVERNOR CRIST: Of course. Item 3. 24 MR. SOLE: Item Number 3. This is a request 25 by Vanderbilt Partners for a five-year sovereignty

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31 submerged lands lease. This will be for a private 1 residential marina containing 49 slips. 2 The 3 consideration is \$31,279. 4 It's worth noting that this item was presented 5 to the Board of Trustees on October 16th in 2007, 6 but was not approved. Since that time, the 7 applicant has provided several other issues to address concerns expressed at the October 2007 8 9 meeting. They've amended their application to provide 10 11 some additional public interest, and that includes 12 adding a provision to the lease which would 13 specifically establish that as sovereignty 14 submerged land lease fees go up, they would clearly 15 have to pay those added lease fees, and in 16 addition, if there's a new surcharge or an 17 additional surcharge that is applied for new 18 marinas, that they would too also pay that new 19 surcharge. 20 Finally, the applicant has also agreed to deed some 54 acres of Water Turkey Bay and South 21 22 Channel. These are acres that are, I think, a 23 cloud on title that the Board of Trustees owns, and this will clear that cloud. 24 25 And additionally, they also want to provide 66

acres of mangrove wetlands to the Board of 1 2 Trustees. This 66 acres is currently protected by 3 a conservation easement, but obviously, conveying 4 title to the Board of Trustees will provide that 5 additional benefit to ensuring protection. 6 Finally, the maintenance of that 66-acre 7 parcel will still be retained by the applicant. 8 However, so will the responsibility also go to 9 Dehor-Wiggins State Park that will partner with them on that. 10 11 We have five speakers on this issue, and I would like to go ahead and introduce those now. 12 We 13 have a speaker, Mr. Bill Hyde. I'll help you, Bill. 14 15 MR. HYDE: Good morning, Governor and members 16 of the Cabinet. My name is William Hyde. I'm here 17 today on behalf of the Vanderbilt Beach Residents Association. 18 19 As Secretary Sole mentioned to you, you've heard this before. This is the fourth time I've 20 been before either this Board or the Water 21 22 Management District Governing Board. This has been 23 a controversial purchase or proposal from the 24 beginning. 25 I would note for your benefit that this is a

project that is opposed not by just a few people, but by the members of my association, 900-plus, plus a petition that was submitted to you in the past of over a thousand-plus signatories, and the Conservancy of Southwest Florida, which recently on June 1st sent to your respective offices a very detailed letter of opposition. This is certainly no casual, slight, or NIMBY type of opposition.

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9 This overhead that's before you right now is 10 the area as it appears today. You can see a very 11 detailed, a very expansive area of high quality contiguous wetlands, and I think that that's the 12 13 area that we're trying to preserve. You see that 14 channel along there that is fringed with mangroves 15 all the way from the south to the north is 16 currently unburdened with anything. It's a natural shoreline. It looks beautiful. It's the way it 17 18 should be, the way nature intended it to be, and 19 that's the area that's going to be changed.

If you could switch to the next one. This is Wiggins Pass, which is very nearby. We put this up just to show you that this is a very shallow area. The pass itself has a control depth of, I believe, three feet. The channel itself leading up to and past this property is three feet max control depth.

And I can assure that, having boated in that area 1 2 on some very small boats, skiffs, we kicked up mud 3 within 50 feet of the shore, and that's something 4 that needs to be kept in mind here. The next site here -- slide is -- and I'm 5 6 going to just hit on this real quickly. You can 7 This site is just unsuitable for a read it. marina. I think it should be evident just from 8 9 looking at the overhead, but let me just highlight 10 some of the reasons why. 11 There's the need for extensive dredging. 12 They've got to do a lot of dredging just to make it 13 deep enough for these boats to get in there in the 14 first place. 15 The distance from the boardwalk entrance to the waterfront, that is, cutting a path from the 16 17 developed areas of uplands to the waterfront 18 through the mangroves, is 900 feet. That's going 19 to be a 12-foot-wide swath for an 8-foot-wide, more The distance from the 20 or less, boardwalk. boardwalk entrance to the end of the southernmost 21 22 dock, almost 1,900 feet. The distance from the 23 sewage pumpout facility, which is kept away on the 24 uplands, 2,000 feet. The need for such a long, 25 wide boardwalk through the mangroves. The

associated destruction and fragmentation of a healthy, high quality mangrove community.

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The shallowness and the meandering nature of the channel through this Outstanding Florida Water, which Vanderbilt Channel and Water Turkey Bay are, through the Gulf of Mexico. And the shallowness and ever-shifting nature of the pass itself, which really limits the size of boats that can use it. And the size of boats is important, because you can have boats here up to 30, maybe even 35 feet utilizing this, and we just think it's unsuitable.

12 Next slide. We have a very real concern about 13 manatees, because there are seagrasses there, and 14 they propose to dredge before the seagrasses --15 without even really knowing by recent survey where 16 the seagrasses are, and we think that's not a good 17 idea.

They propose to protect the seagrasses by extending the docks farther out into the channel and then putting riprap in front of them, that is, on the waterward side of the seagrasses, supposedly to protect them from prop wash and the like. I think this is a bad idea.

You know, the manatees feed on the seagrass.
This is one of the few areas of seagrass in this

community where they are still available to feed. I don't think they're going to have easy access anymore, especially when you consider the pilings, the docks, and the boats, in addition to the riprap. It's going to pretty well effectively bar them from feeding in those areas. It's going to push them into the narrow channel, and it's going to increase the boat traffic in the area, I think all to their detriment.

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Finally, a major issue, water quality. 10 11 There's poor existing water quality at the site 12 already. Turbidity is a major problem. And when 13 you have a shallow-bottomed area like this, boats 14 are constantly kicking up and resuspending the 15 solids and sediments that have -- you know, over 16 time, they sink and get down to the bottom, but the 17 prop wash kicks them back up again. And you're 18 just going to have this constant resuspension, and 19 you're going to have oils and greases associated 20 with these additional boats.

21 And I think that the distance of the sewage 22 pumpout facilities from the boats, 2,000 feet at 23 maximum, especially those southernmost slips, does 24 increase the likelihood of illegal sewage holding 25 tank discharges by boaters. I mean, let's be real.

That does happen, and I think that that's something 1 2 that is another concern that we all have. 3 I know that the standard today is whether this 4 is not contrary to the public interest. But this 5 is an Outstanding Florida Water, and I think that 6 that Outstanding Florida Water status should inform 7 your decision on what the public interest is here 8 This is a private ownership oriented marina today. 9 for the private benefit of this developer and boat 10 owners. There's no public access. And I don't 11 think there's any demonstration that this is 12 clearly in the public interest, or for that matter, 13 not contrary to the public interest. 14 This is the channel as it looks today. It's 15 pretty neat. I mean, one side, the west side of 16 the channel is typical of what you see throughout 17 Florida, especially South Florida. You have a 18 bulkheaded seawall and grass right down to the 19 On the other hand, on the other side, bulkhead. 20 you have this really beautiful, essentially

> undisturbed, high quality mangrove community that -- next slide -- you are proposing to convert to this. That's what it's going to look like. That was Photoshopped. We put the 49 boats in the best way we could to show you what it's going to look

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And I think you have to make the judgment as to whether that's in the public interest or contrary to the public interest. I think it is contrary to the public interest, and I hope you will agree. Thank you.

7 MR. SOLE: Before I go to the next speaker, there are a couple of things I just want to clear 8 9 the record on. One, the dredging is 3,400 cubic yards, which is not considered significant. Number 10 11 two, a seagrass survey was done on June 6th of this 12 year recently to verify locations of the seagrass. 13 Controlling depths of Wiggins Pass is about five feet. And finally, the boardwalk that was referred 14 15 to is not 12 foot. It's an 8-foot-wide boardwalk.

Our next speaker is Ms. Kathy Robbins.

17 MS. ROBBINS: Good morning. My name is Kathy 18 I am secretary of the Vanderbilt Beach Robbins. 19 Residents Association, which, as Bill mentioned, consists of over 900 households in the Vanderbilt 20 Beach area. I am speaking to you today to urge you 21 22 not to approve the request for this sovereign 23 submerged lands lease.

24As was mentioned earlier, part of the25situation includes various conservation easements

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that have been granted on the lands, and I'm going to cover that today. What you're looking at now is an October of 2000, the PUD Master Plan for Collier County. This land was identified as a conservation easement wetland/upland preserve, so gifting this land to the State serves no further public advantage.

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On the next map, we will see that a conservation easement for this area was deeded to South Florida Water Management in July of 2000. Okay. That's this yellow area right there.

12 Now, in the next slide, you'll see that they 13 partially released part of the land, and actually, 14 the part that they released is identified in red. 15 It's the part that they intend to put the boat 16 slips on. So they deeded the land to the Southwest Florida Management District, and then they took it 17 back because they realized they needed it for the 18 19 boat docks.

20 Now, on the next map, you'll see that on March 21 17th of 2008, just last year, they deeded the same 22 underwater land to the Board of County 23 Commissioners of Collier County.

24So the point of this is that a further deeding25of the land -- this is the same land, the same

40 1 submerged land and the same upland land that they 2 have covered now by three agencies, three different 3 conservation easements. And I don't think giving 4 the same land to three different public agencies 5 adds anything at all to the public interest. 6 That's all I have to say. Thank you. 7 GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you. MR. SOLE: And just so we don't let that go 8 9 unanswered --10 CFO SINK: Yes, would you clarify that, 11 please. 12 MR. SOLE: Clearly, the Board of Trustees and 13 the Department of Environmental Protection believes 14 that actually, especially the Water Turkey Lake 15 region, that we do have clear title. There is some 16 title dispute there, and this action would actually 17 eliminate that title dispute and would specifically 18 -- not a conservation easement, specifically clear 19 title, quit-claim that title to the Board of 20 Trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund. And we think that's in the best interest of the 21 State to ensure that we obtain and retain title to 22 23 that property. 24 Our next speaker is Mr. Steve Lewis. 25 MR. LEWIS: Governor and members of the Board,

my name is Steve Lewis. I'm with the law firm of Lewis, Longman & Walker. We represent the applicant and have been working on this project, obviously, for quite some time.

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I'm really here to tell you why we think this project should be approved. The last time there was, I would say, somewhat of a concern about the adequacy of the public benefit, and also a little bit about the fees and, you know, trying to maximize revenue to the State.

11 As was pointed out by Secretary Sole, we are 12 giving 66 acres of uplands, privately owned uplands to the State of Florida, which ultimately will end 13 14 up in Wiggins Pass. And we will continue to 15 maintain that for the benefit of the public and 16 enjoyment of the public and remove exotics and 17 things of that nature in perpetuity, which brings 18 value, clear value to the State.

19The issue of ownership in that area is20complex. It goes back almost to statehood. And21what we have suggested to our clients is that we22just simply quit-claim all of our interest in that23area, the Vanderbilt Channel as well as the Water24Turkey Bay area. It consists of about 54 acres,25and we think this is again something that really

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just benefits the public.

2 As far as revenue, you know, we suggested 3 adding a condition into the lease that would 4 capture these future fees should they be adopted. 5 Again, that would also be beneficial to the State. 6 You know, conservatively, I estimate that this will 7 probably generate over the life of the project kind of a minimum of a quarter million, maybe as much as 8 9 a half a million dollars of revenue to the State. And theoretically, this goes on in perpetuity as 10 11 long as those structures are there.

12 You know, as to the project itself, you've heard a lot about different environmental issues. 13 14 Your rules suggest that the Board should take into 15 consideration the regulatory standards applied by 16 the Department and the Water Management District in 17 analyzing a proposed activity in waters of the 18 They have concluded that we meet all the State. 19 standards as it relates to any impacts on water 20 quality, even navigation resources. You know, we have designed everything to meet or exceed those 21 22 regulatory standards, which your rule says you need 23 to take into consideration. We are well below, well below what's allowable under the manatee 24 25 protection plan, significantly below it.

We are clearly not going to create any kind of navigational problems. The Vanderbilt Lagoon area south of us, including the bridge, typically the passageways are in the neighborhood of 100 to 125 feet. Our setback is 171 feet. And just to give you some perspective, if you were to go to the foyer here and walk all the way down to the cafeteria, that's the open water area that will continue to be open to the navigable public.

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A couple of other things that I would like to 10 11 mention. You know, we have almost two miles of 12 riparian shoreline, yet we're only asking for 49 13 docks. If you look right across the way -- Tim, 14 just that one -- if you would, show that one of the facility across the way. If you look right across 15 16 the way from us, there is a facility there that 17 berthed the last time we met 47 docks. They've 18 since received permits to add another 12 docks, and 19 they now have, you know, 59 slips. You know, we're 20 asking for 49, you know, and I would suggest that, you know, we're not even remotely overreaching. 21

We have done everything that everyone has asked to us do and more. You know, I think under any objective standard, you know, we meet the requirements under Chapter 18-21. Clearly, this

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project is not contrary to the public interest.

The control depth, like the Secretary said, is really minus 5. It was designed by the Corps of Engineers when they did the pass. You know, we're putting a restriction on our drafts of 2 1/2 feet to address any kind of sedimentation or water quality problems raised here today and in the past.

We've clearly designed this to avoid the 8 9 minimal amount of seagrasses that are in that area. 10 This is not an area frequented by manatees. In 11 fact, I'm told -- and I'm not an expert in this 12 area, but I do have a minor in biology -- that this 13 is not the type of -- this ephemeral type grass is 14 not even fed upon by manatees. You know, that's 15 what I hear.

16 You know, we have 635 residents. They 17 desperately would like to have some docks, not a 18 lot, considering they have two miles, almost two 19 miles of riparian shoreline. You know, we 20 respectfully request that you approve this. It's not unreasonable, and like I said, I think we meet 21 22 all of your standards.

We have a couple of other folks just brieflythat would like to speak.

MR. SOLE: Our next speaker is Ms. Pam

Mac'Kie. Pam?

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MS. MAC'KIE: Good after -- no, good morning. I'm Pam Mac'Kie, and I'm a resident of The Dunes, and I'm here simply to say that we, the 600-and-some-odd residents of The Dunes, would very much like to have access to the waterway that we look out over.

I have a boat, but I have to keep it somewhere 8 9 else. I may or may not be able to get one of these 10 few boat slips. But my neighbors across the way 11 who are opposing this have, I don't know, hundreds, 12 900-some-odd boat slips. And we would like at 13 least to have access to the waterway too. And we 14 are the public, and we would appreciate your 15 approval of this application. Thank you.

16 MR. SOLE: Our last speaker is Justin Finch. 17 MR. FINCH: Good morning. My name is Captain 18 Justin Finch. I have lived in this area of North 19 Naples-Vanderbilt Beach, for 24 years now. Eight 20 years of that, I've actually lived on the water at 21 the southern end of this waterway, which we call 22 Vanderbilt Lagoon.

23 While most kids were contemplating a paper 24 route, I spent my weekends on a little Jon boat 25 practicing being a fishing guide. At the age of

16, I started crewing on commercial fishing boats,
 and by the age of 18, I had obtained the
 requirements to achieve my master captain's
 license. I've been licensed now for 16 years. All
 of this experience has been on the waterway that
 we're talking about today.

For the past six years, I've been the 7 owner-operator of South Bay Marina, which is 8 located at the southern end of Vanderbilt Lagoon. 9 10 Our primary business is boat rentals and fishing 11 charters, so you can imagine it's extremely 12 important to me, the issue of navigation. We 13 already have a half-hour travel time one way just 14 to get out to Wiggins Pass. So through the course 15 of a day, that adds up to two, possibly three hours 16 of my time is going through this waterway. I 17 estimate my travel through that particular waterway 18 is in excess of 600 times per year.

19I have no concerns about this project that's20being proposed today. For the past six months,21we've actually been sharing this waterway with22several construction barges as new docks were being23built on the west side of this channel. The24largest of these barges is 35 by 70 feet, and we25never -- me and the other 1,500 boaters in the area

never had any issues working around them or through their construction area.

I was impressed with this project when I found out they were not going to propose floating docks. For the past 10 years, all of the projects that have been brought forth have been floating docks. And for me, I saw that as a big environmental concession, because there's a lot of convenience, especially with most of community of The Dunes being older.

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11 I am not -- I don't have a Ph.D. in any 12 biology, but I can tell you about the manatees in 13 our area. I can tell you -- I can't tell you where 14 they come from or where they go, but when they're 15 in our area, they use it like a rest stop. They're 16 only there for a day or two. I've been able to 17 find three areas where they tend to congregate when 18 they do stay overnight. This area where the 19 proposed docks are going to be is not one of them. 20 The channel does favor the seawall side, which would be the westward side of the channel, and that 21 22 tends to be the highway for the manatee when they 23 do come through.

24I keep hearing the issue about this boardwalk.25We have a mile-long boardwalk that's utilized by

48 the County, and it is actually kind of a gem for 1 2 our area. People really like it, and it has been 3 very functional for 20-plus years, as long as I can 4 remember. 5 Also, we've lost several marinas in the six 6 years that I've been in business, and we have a 7 serious overcrowding situation at our boat ramps. So any effort to give the folks at The Dunes docks 8 9 will take some of the load off our already 10 overcrowded boat ramps. 11 I came here today to volunteer my time, and I 12 feel that -- if I felt that this ecosystem, which I depend on for my livelihood, was remotely going to 13 14 be affected by this project, I would be the first 15 person to stand here and object, and I am for this 16 project. Thank you. 17 GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you. 18 MR. SOLE: Governor and Cabinet, as you can 19 see, this has been a longstanding project. I think 20 it started, believe it or not, in 1998, so this unfortunately has been doing on for some time. 21 22 I know there may be questions. I'm sure myself, Mr. Hyde, or Mr. Lewis will be able to 23 24 answer those. 25 GOVERNOR CRIST: Any questions?

49 1 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I do have one, 2 Governor. It seems to me the Nature Conservancy 3 opposed this, Andy, last time. Did you not oppose 4 this project last time? 5 MR. McLEOD: I don't think so, Attorney 6 General, no. 7 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Okay. I thought 8 you had. Perhaps not. 9 CFO SINK: The Conservancy of Southwest 10 Florida. MR. SOLE: Yes, I think it was the Conservancy 11 12 of Southwest Florida. 13 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: The Conservancy of Southwest Florida came and did that. All right. I 14 15 knew somebody had come in here and testified who 16 wasn't here today doing that. CFO SINK: I'll move it, Governor. 17 18 GOVERNOR CRIST: I'll second it. Is there any 19 objection? 20 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I'm going to object. I don't see the change. I see some things 21 22 that have changed, but not enough to change my 23 vote. 24 GOVERNOR CRIST: Okay. It passes three to 25 one.

50 1 GOVERNOR CRIST: State Board of Administration. Ash. Item 1. 2 3 MR. WILLIAMS: Good morning. Item 1 is 4 requesting approval of the minutes from the May 27 5 meeting. 6 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion on the 7 minutes? 8 CFO SINK: Move it. 9 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 10 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show the 11 minutes approved without objection. 12 Item 2 is a fiscal sufficiency MR. WILLIAMS: 13 for State Board of Education Lottery revenue bonds. 14 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion on Item 2? 15 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 2. 16 CFO SINK: I second. 17 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 18 approved without objection. 19 MR. WILLIAMS: Item 3, fiscal sufficiency for 20 full faith and credit, State Board of Education, 21 capital outlay refunding bonds. 22 CFO SINK: Move it. 23 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 24 25 approved without objection.

1 MR. WILLIAMS: Item 4, another fiscal sufficiency, State Board of Education capital 2 outlay bonds, 2009 Series A. 3 4 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 4. 5 CFO SINK: Second. 6 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 7 approved without objection. MR. WILLIAMS: Item 5, I would like to request 8 a motion to defer. This is a rule adoption 9 10 relating to revisions of investment policy for the Local Government Pool. We'll have the Local 11 12 Participant Advisory Council meeting on the 18th. We would like to get the benefit of their guidance 13 14 on this and come back to you with a completely updated version of this reflecting the current 15 16 changes. 17 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move to defer Item 5. 18 19 CFO SINK: Second. 20 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 21 deferred without objection. 22 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. Item 6 is relating to the reimbursement formula for the Cat Fund. 23 Tt. 24 simply conforms the formula to House Bill 1495. At 25 the last meeting we approved this direction, and

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52 1 now we have the benefit of the bill, and this just completes the action. 2 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Move Item 6. 3 4 CFO SINK: Second. 5 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 6 approved without objection. 7 MR. WILLIAMS: Item 7 is likewise to reflect 8 changes in House Bill 1495 and handles things 9 relating to insurer reporting requirements for the 10 Cat Fund. GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion on Item 7? 11 12 CFO SINK: Move it. 13 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 14 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 15 approved without objection. 16 MR. WILLIAMS: Item 8 is a similar issue, 17 different rule, insurer responsibilities, but again, it's a conformance issue with the 18 19 legislation. 20 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 8. 21 CFO SINK: Second. GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 22 23 approved without objection. 24 MR. WILLIAMS: Item 9 is going ahead with 25 normal rulemaking reflecting the provisions of

53 1 House Bill 1495. 2 CFO SINK: I move it. 3 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. 4 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 5 approved without objection. 6 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. Item 10 relates to 7 the budgets for the State Board of Administration. We have five different entities here. We have the 8 9 State Board itself, we have the Public Employee 10 Optional Retirement Program, the Cat Fund, Florida Prepaid, and the Division of Bond Finance. 11 12 What I would like to do today, with the Board's concurrence, is divide these and take up 13 14 the budgets of all the entities except the SBA 15 itself. And with regard to the SBA, what I would 16 like to do there is have the benefit of the 17 guidance of your appointees to the Investment 18 Advisory Council and also the Local Participant 19 Advisory Council, both of which are meeting here in 20 Tallahassee on the 18th of this month. 21 We have essentially moved ahead in our 22 preliminary budget recommendation with a number of 23 initiatives that were commenced last year, and we 24 have introduced new ones, with a very strong focus 25 on safety, soundness, independent compliance, open

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communications, and transparency.

These things involve people and consulting dollars primarily. Over 80 percent of our budget is in fact consulting dollars used for various investment and compliance-related activities. Recognizing the times we're in, we want to strike the right balance between properly attending to safety and soundness and a quality investment effort, but also keeping costs under control to the maximum extent possible, sharpening our pencil wherever we can.

12 So what I would like to do is request a motion 13 for a continuation budget for the SBA, with the 14 understanding that we will come back to you 15 subsequent to the meeting of the Investment 16 Advisory Council and the Local Participant Advisory Council on 18 June with revisions reflecting our 17 18 ability to sharpen our pencil and cut overhead a 19 bit.

If that's agreeable to you, what I would also like to do is go ahead today and walk you quickly through the budgets of the Public Employee Optional Retirement Plan, the Cat Fund, Prepaid, Bond Finance, and get those handled. And we have representatives from all of those organizations

55 1 here today to provide backup if you would like 2 to --3 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: And you would like 4 those approved today? The continuation is strictly 5 the State Board of Administration budget? 6 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir. 7 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I would move to do 8 that. 9 CFO SINK: I second. GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show 10 11 that approved without objection. 12 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. Why don't we then 13 move ahead with the individual budgets that we are 14 going to cover today. 15 With regard to the Public Employee Optional 16 Retirement Program or the defined contribution 17 plan, we basically have a decrease of 7.7 percent 18 in that budget. The contribution rate has remained 19 the same that's set by the Legislature at 20 5 percent. And we've been able to hold the line on a variety of other things so that the net change is 21 22 a decrease of 7.7 percent. 23 CFO SINK: Governor, we have separate -- do we 24 need separate motions? 25 GOVERNOR CRIST: I think that's the request.

56 1 MR. WILLIAMS: I think we do. 2 CFO SINK: Okay. I'll move approval of the 3 Public Employee Optional Retirement Program. ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: 4 Second. 5 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 6 approved without objection. 7 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. The Florida 8 Hurricane Catastrophe Fund has an increase of 1.44 9 percent if you set aside the huge decrease in their 10 budget that results from not having a financial 11 product to purchase in the budget this year. 12 The actual number when you look at their budget document shows a decrease that's absolutely 13 14 huge. It's 90-some-odd percent. That's somewhat 15 misleading, because it shows the nonexistence of a 16 financial product. But if you drill down past that 17 and look at the actual overhead, it's a 18 1.44 percent increase. And I would recommend your 19 adoption. 20 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move the 21 adoption of the Florida Hurricane Catastrophe Fund 22 budget. 23 CFO SINK: Second. 24 GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it 25 approved without objection.

1 Thank you. On the Florida MR. WILLIAMS: Prepaid Tuition Program budget, there is a net 2 3 decrease of 0.53 percent there. The Florida 4 Prepaid Board, which, of course, is an independent 5 statutory body, has met and approved this budget. 6 CFO SINK: I move approval. 7 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second. GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. 8 Show it 9 approved without objection. 10 Thank you. The Division of MR. WILLIAMS: 11 Bond Finance is primarily a transaction-driven 12 budget, and it's anticipated that, given the number 13 of transactions that will take place next year, the 14 level of financial advisory services, bond rating 15 services, and advertising costs, together with the 16 increase in negotiated transactions versus 17 competitive transactions, will increase costs for 18 the Division of Bond Finance over the coming year. 19 Their budget, which is solely driven by multiplying 20 the number of transactions times those estimated 21 costs, provides a net increase of 13.34 percent. 22 ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move that item. 23 I move the Division of Bond Finance budget. 24 GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a second? 25 CFO SINK: Just a second. I'm just making
