GOVERNOR CRIST: The next Cabinet meeting will be Tuesday, May 11th.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement,

Mark Zadra. Mark, how are you this morning? I

look forward to your presentation.

MR. ZADRA: Good morning, Governor and members of the Cabinet. We have two items on the agenda today. The first is the minutes of the February 24, 2010 Cabinet meeting, and we respectfully request approval of those minutes.

CFO SINK: Move it.

COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second.

GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show the minutes approved without objection.

MR. ZADRA: The next item is our nine sets of rules which are being submitted for final approval.

I would like to point out that there were no public hearings that were requested to discuss the proposed changes. And essentially they incorporate just cleanup language, changes in -- statutory changes in past sessions, and there are no major policy shifts associated with any of the rules.

10	MR. ZADRA: Thank you.
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1	GOVERNOR CRIST: Board of Trustees, Secretary
2	Sole. Good morning, Mr. Secretary.
3	MR. SOLE: Governor, good morning, and Cabinet
4	members.
5	Item Number 1, submittal of the minutes from
6	the February 24, 2010 Cabinet meeting.
7	CFO SINK: Move it.
8	COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Second.
9	GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show the
10	minutes approved without objection.
11	MR. SOLE: Thank you. Item Number 2, this is
12	a request to proceed with final adoption of our
13	proposed amendments to the Department's or the
14	Board's state land acquisition procedures. This is
15	Rule 18-1. The amendments update and modify the
16	appraisal requirements for the Board of Trustees'
17	land acquisitions. These amendments are primarily
18	due to legislative changes, and we're implementing
19	the legislation.
20	GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion?
21	CFO SINK: Move it.
22	ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second.
23	GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it
24	approved without objection.
25	MR. SOLE: Item Number 3, this is Southern

Keys Cemetery encroachment. This is a request to determine that a .019-acre parcel of state-owned lands is no longer needed for conservation purposes. The site is located in Monroe County.

And the request is that we surplus and sell this to Southern Keys Cemetery.

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The ramifications of this issue are, bottom line, in 2007 the Board authorized us to move forward with the Florida Forever acquisition.

There was an encroachment that was identified subsequent to closing. We've identified that encroachment as roughly an 8-foot by 150-foot long segment of property, and we're requesting to sell that to the adjacent property.

The consideration is \$300, and that's based upon comparable sales.

GOVERNOR CRIST: Is there a motion?

COMMISSIONER BRONSON: Motion on Item 3.

ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second.

GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it approved without objection.

MR. SOLE: Thank you. Item Number 4, this is a request to the Board to determine that it's in the public interest to sell 4.2 acres of filled, formerly submerged lands to -- in Bay County to the

Panama City-Bay County Airport Authority and Industrial District. The consideration is 210,000, which is 100 percent of the appraised value.

The situation is, we've got 4.2 acres of formerly filled lands that were part of an easement that the Board provided in 1970. In light of the changes in land use anticipated with the old airport authority, the DEP recommends that we do consider it to be in the public interest to convey this parcel because it's landlocked. Our ability to manage this small piece of property within this landlocked area would be very difficult and costly, and the cost to restore it would also be significant.

One of the key issues involved is that there is currently an easement that the Board granted in 1970 to the Airport Authority. As part of this proposal, we would ask that they obviously release the easement, that the property go back total interest to the Board of Trustees, which is -- some of it is actually in the submerged land itself.

Finally, we need a final survey on this parcel. And one request to the Board which is not in the item -- and I apologize for that -- is, I'm requesting that the Board give us authorization to

1	adjust the purchase price based upon the final
2	surveyed acreage. We don't expect to see any
3	significant change. Currently, it's roughly
4	\$50,000 per acre.

7	GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it
8	approved without objection.
9	MR. SOLE: Thank you.
10	GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you, Secretary.

16	With regard to this report, in relation to
17	Sudan, we have no new scrutinized companies. We
18	have one company removed from the scrutinized list.
19	And on the continued examination list, we have two
20	removed and four added.
21	With regard to Iran, we have no adds or
22	removals from the scrutinized list and no changes
23	in the continued exam list.
24	ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: I move Item 2.
25	CFO SINK: Second.

GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it approved without objection.

MR. WILLIAMS: Item 3, request approval of a draft letter to the Joint Legislative Auditing Committee affirming that the SBA Trustees have reviewed and approved the monthly LGIP management summary reports and actions taken, if any, to address material impacts. There were no material impacts.

CFO SINK: I move it.

ATTORNEY GENERAL McCOLLUM: Second.

GOVERNOR CRIST: Moved and seconded. Show it approved without objection.

GOVERNOR CRIST: CFO, I think you have a question?

CFO SINK: Yes. Thank you, Governor.

Ash, as you know, I'm curious and have made some inquiries over the past couple of days about the apparently serious nature of the Goldman Sachs SEC charges of fraud. And I'm curious to know whether or not our retirement system or the SBA had under management any of the subject investments, and also, the impact as a result of this fraud -- obviously, their stock price declined by probably a double-digit amount -- and what our positioning is

as a shareholder in the company, Goldman Sachs.
Will you update us?

MR. WILLIAMS: Several answers to your question, CFO. You're not alone in your concern, and we appreciate the vigilance of the Trustees on this matter.

First of all, the SBA did not own any of the securities that are in question with regard to the SEC action. We do not own them currently, and we have not owned them in the past.

Secondly, with regard to the share price, I think it's early days in this whole matter. We have allegations that have only recently been revealed, and I think those need to play through. We don't really know where the share price situation will be longer term.

In terms of our exposure to Goldman Sachs equity, we certainly have some. We, as you know, own the Russell 3000 index, which is the broadest market index there is of equity, so we would have a proportional exposure to Goldman. To my knowledge, we don't have any significant active bets on that would give us more exposure to Goldman than we would otherwise have.

We also do business with Goldman on a couple

of other fronts. We have two different fixed income management relationships with them. Both of them are performing close to or ahead of benchmark, and we're happy with the job that has been done

there.

In addition, last week I spoke with one of the most senior members of the Goldman management team and asked the question whether there were other facts not yet public that might be revealed prospectively that should be of interest to us as fiduciaries. The answer was no. The assertion was that Goldman is very comfortable with their position. They have posted on their website the notice they received from the SEC. They have also posted the many, many, many documents they have provided to the SEC in response thereto.

I also asked the question as to whether there are any aspects of this matter or any other matters ongoing at Goldman that will have a bearing on the other asset management relationships we have with the firm, and the answer again was negative.

CFO SINK: Well, I hope you'll stay in close touch with our securities litigation firms, because my office became aware that some other states are looking at possible action. I agree with you it is

1	a little bit early in the process, but in our
2	position as the fourth largest pension fund, I'm
3	sure you're going to be in close touch with our
4	outside advisors.
5	MR. WILLIAMS: Agreed.
6	CFO SINK: Thank you.
7	MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you.
8	GOVERNOR CRIST: Thank you very much. We
9	stand adjourned.
